

## **Navigating Across Rare and Complex Conditions & Scaling Solutions,**

### **Kate Holliday, PhD MHP MHSc Grad Dip Nutr BN, CEO Centre for Community-Driven Research**

Kate is a nurse, researcher and Founder, Chief Executive and at the Centre for Community-Driven Research (CCDR). Kate has worked in the health sector for more than 20 years listed on the 100+ Outstanding Women Nurse and Midwife Leaders by the International Council of Nurses, Women in Global Health, World Health Organisation and UNDP and in 2022 was a finalist for the Health Minister's Award for Nursing Trailblazers. Kate has worked in a number of settings with a consistent motivation on ensuring patients are not only at the centre of decision-making but rather, leading it. Kate's clinical work has focused on community-based care and health system navigation, with a focus on complex conditions,. In 2012, Kate started to develop and test a model of community-based telehealth nursing care that in 2019 was expanded into a pilot program across 10 disease areas. This is now the Pathways telehealth nurse program which will be further expanded across more disease areas and internationally. This is a model of care that provides a patient with a holistic care plan and makes the best use of all that is available to them in the Australian health system. Kate has held positions in clinical work, alongside policy, research and advocacy work, and worked with government, industry, not-for-profit organisations as well as research and international organisations including the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunisations (GAVI), former Head of Research at Cancer Council NSW Australia, former Board Director at Health Technology Assessment International (HTAi).

## **Navigating the path to adulthood: Legal capacity, decision-making, and profound intellectual disability,**

Michelle is a sociologist and lawyer completing a PhD in Law at the Australian Centre for Health Law Research at the Queensland University of Technology. Her work is about the operation of law and regulation in practice for people with profound intellectual and multiple disabilities during their transition to adulthood, which includes healthcare, the NDIS, Centrelink, banking, and guardianship/administration systems. She is a researcher, educator and advocate in disability law, policy, and practice. Michelle has lived experience in complex disability, decision-making, and the transition to adulthood as a parent and supporter of her 23-year-old daughter, Daelle, who has profound intellectual and multiple disabilities.
